HIST 370 Native American Oral History and Traditions, offered through USD, would limit the oral histories to a specific community, which would limit the focus of the course. The proposed course focuses on how various fields of study approach the methods, theories, and ethics of oral history. In AIS/HIST 373 Oral History, students practice conducting oral history interviews rather than studying oral history traditions. This course will not be limited to Native American history.</p>
