This course explores various decision-making frameworks, such as rational choice theory, prospect theory, and personality theories, to inform the study of international behavior. This course offers a more complete understanding of how leaders make foreign policy decisions and examines several cases of American foreign policy.

Provide explanation of differences between proposed course and existing system catalog courses below:

The proposed course provides a unique addition to the political science curriculum and differs significantly from the existing courses. CA 430 studies the theories and principles in judgment and decision-making and behavioral economics including heuristics and biases, role of emotion and social forces. POLS 350 has a broad scope and therefore provides only an introduction to the study of international relations theories and foreign policy. It is the gateway to the other courses in this subfield. POLS 453 concentrates only on American foreign policy, in particular foreign policy towards various regions and countries. It has strong historical components that are only applicable to the US. The proposed course brings a new subfield of international relations: political psychology. It examines foreign policy decision-making processes, particularly with reference to leaders and different psychological models of decision making in multiple countries, not just the US. It places greater emphasis

on the psychology of foreign policy decision making, which makes the class relevant across the world.
