The Modern Language Requirement for the major may be waived if examination shows the student has achieved a level of language learning equivalent to that of students who have completed 21 credit hours in a language and are able to use the language at an intermediate level (Intermediate Low according to the ACTFL scale). The school will evaluate the documentation. A student may be exempt from examination at SDSU if they have successfully completed one or more of the nationally administered tests showing an equivalent level of proficiency. ## 8. Explanation of the Change:

The School of American and Global Studies and the Global Studies program therein are updating the list of electives to the Global Studies major by adding, deleting, and changing the prefix of courses based upon updates by contributing programs. GER 434, GLST 125, and HIST 312 have not been taught for several years and are no longer offered. GER 435, GER 454, and GER 455, as well as HIST/POLS 381 and HIST 445 are courses actively taught by faculty in those programs, and given their contemporary global importance, they are great course options to add to the elective lists for GLST majors with no extra cost to the university.

The additional wording added under Modern Language requirement Option 1 serves to clarify that students must acquire the 202 and below language credits no matter where they begin their language program based upon placement. If a student, for example, places at the 202 level and begins their program there, they are still required to acquire the credits for 101-201. That had been the intent of the major all along, reflected in its original program proposal.
