As part of the Global Studies major, students in this program must complete/earn:

- 21 credits of Modern Language
  - Option 1: 6 Credits in one language above the 202 level; FREN 300+/ GER 300+/ SPAN 300+
  - Option 2: Two Languages (approval required)
  - Option 3: Qualified Waiver (approval required)
- 12 credits from the Global Studies electives lists
  - No more than 6 credits per prefix;
  - o No more than 3 credits of lower division coursework credits (100-200 level courses)
- 3 credits of a cross-cultural experience outside of the United States (study abroad or international internship) that lasts at least 4 weeks.

As part of the College of Arts, Humanities and Social Sciences, students in this program must complete/earn:

- a minimum of 33 upper division credits (300-400 level courses)
- a capstone course in the major
- a minor, second major, or teaching specialization
- a grade of C or better is required in CMST 101, ENGL 101, SGR #5 Mathematics, in all education coursework, and all courses for the major
- 6+ credits of Modern Foreign Language coursework, including completion of the 202-Level

Testing into a higher-level language course may reduce time to graduation. To begin coursework above the 101 level, take the free modern language placement test at <a href="https://www.sdstate.edu/school-american-and-global-studies/language-placement-information">https://www.sdstate.edu/school-american-and-global-studies/language-placement-information</a> Once student passes a higher-level course (except conversation) with a grade of C or better, students can be granted credit for courses in a specified language from 101 and up to 202 for a nominal fee. Students with any modern language experience are strongly encouraged to complete the placement test and register for the appropriate course according to their language proficiency level.
