



Learning in a Flipped Classroom

What is a flipped classroom?

- A flipped classroom is a way to increase student engagement with class material by having students complete and review coursework before class (ex. assigned readings and/or videos).
 - This allows class time to be used for problem solving and discussion.

How do I prepare for class discussion?

- Limit distractions
 - The positive thing about a flipped classroom is that you get to choose the environment that you learn in! Pick somewhere that you know you will learn best.
 - Avoid environments that will be distracting to you and your learning.
 - Turn off notifications on your phone AND computer.
- Take notes:
 - When doing the assigned readings or studying from the course materials, take notes on what sticks out to you.
 - Write down different questions you have for the professor to answer during in-class discussion.

How do I participate in class discussion?

- Don't be afraid to contribute your ideas to the class.
- Listen to what your peers have to say.
- Ask any questions you have from preparing the night before.
- Take part in class activities.
- Offer help to peers with topics you understand and be willing to take help from peers on topics that you may need a little extra help on.

Do some reflecting!

- What did you notice worked really well for you at home and in class?
- What could you do differently to enhance your learning experience next time?
- Do you have any concerns about the workload?
 - If so, tell your professor! They appreciate feedback.
- What are your resources if you find yourself needing extra help?
