## 8. Explanation of the Change:

The history program and School of American and Global Studies will require students pursuing a history major to complete a practical skill development experience through the requirement of an internship or field experience placement. In the event that students who for some reason cannot complete an internship or field experience, or have a specific reason otherwise such as graduate program preparation, the school will require them to complete an additional upper-level history course.

The history program is restructuring its curriculum to create five emphases within the major. This change was prompted by comments from external reviewers during the program’s spring 2023 Institutional Program Review, reflecting a trend within the discipline across the country, and subsequent program and school discussions.

None of the changes herein apply to history majors pursuing teaching specialization.
