Soybean Nitrogen Credit after a Drought Stressed Year

Many Southern South Dakota corn and soybean producers are well into harvest in this moisture stressed year. Hopefully, next year's moisture and yields will be better. To that end, a good soil test is needed to plan for a successful crop year. Fertilizer costs are likely to remain high and taking a soybean credit will save on nitrogen dollars for next year's corn or wheat crop. We often hear the statement that with poor sovbean yields, a nitrogen credit should not be taken. That is not correct. If soybean made any growth, a full 40 lb/a credit should be taken. Most soybean fields in the drought stressed areas had at least 20 inches of growth, had active nodules and contained at least some pods. The N credit comes from the nodules, the roots themselves and compounds that the roots exude or release. These

sources of organic N breakdown readily and are available for next year's crop. So even if the soybean crop was cut for hay, we still would take the soybean credit. The 40 lb/a value is an average over the long term for South Dakota and the region. Research has shown the credit can vary quite significantly from this value, but has little relationship to soybean yield.

A soil sample should be taken to a depth of two feet to measure available nitrate-N. In addition to the N credit that will be released, soil available N should also be taken into consideration for the next crop. Available N will usually range from 20 to 50 lbs/a after soybean but can be substantially higher than this as well. Foundation Winter Wheat Sales Down

With the dry conditions across all of South Dakota, winter wheat plantings are expected to be down as compared to previous years. Foundation Seed sales were reduced as well with only 7,669 bushels of winter wheat sold this fall, a reduction of 25%. Ideal, SDSU's new release in 2011 again was the top selling variety with 2,202 bu. followed closely by Overland at 2,183 bu. Sales of Expedition and Lyman increased slightly as compared to 2011. Wesley was down significantly with Ideal replacing many of those seed acres (Ideal is one half Wesley). There were no new varieties released in 2012.

Importance of Timely Bulk Sales Certificates

Bulk sales certificates need to be issued at the time of sale. Late or missing bulk sales certificates create confusion for all parties. The greatest confusion will be on the part of the buyer. At the time of purchase the buyer needs to be informed if the variety has PVP. The easiest way to do this is through the Bulk Sales Certificate. Just mark the correct level on the bulk sales certificate. Doing this will leave no question with the buyer as to what he can or cannot do with the seed and subsequent crop.

PVP Directory Change

In the variety tables in the front of the South Dakota Certified Seed Grower Directory, there has been a change in the PVP column. This change will make it easier for you to determine which type of protection needs to be marked on the bulk sales certificate. The choices listed in the column are – PVP Title V, PVP 94, Yes and No. The PVP Title V indicates that the variety has Plant Variety Protection with Title V meaning that it can only be sold by variety name as a class of certified seed. PVP-94 indicates that the variety has Plant Variety Protection. This type of protection does require that the seed be sold as a class of certified seed, but you must have the owners' permission to offer the seed for sale. "Yes" means that PVP has been applied for and is pending. In most cases this means that the variety will be granted PVP Title V. The word "No" in the column means that the variety has no protection and can be sold without the variety name as common seed. With spring wheat there are no varieties without PVP. Winter wheat only has Arapahoe, Jerry, and Wesley that can be sold as common seed.
